
Council Tax Reduction Scheme 2016/17 consultation


Proposal A - Reduce the amount of savings you can have and still receive Council Tax Support. Current scheme: Up to £6,000 of capital/ savings/ investments and any other assets is ignored in calculating the level of Council Tax Support. Between £6.000 and £16.000 we add £1 to the weekly income used to decide entitlement for every £250 or part thereof. The value of a person's home is also ignored. Proposed change: Where the value of capital/ savings/ investments and any other assets held is £6,000 or more no Council Tax Support will be granted. The value of a person's home will still be ignored. Example 1: Mr and Mrs W have four children, aged 14, 4, 2 and 1. Mr W is unemployed and receives Job Seekers Allowance, Mrs W receives Child Tax Credit, Child Benefit, child maintenance and Personal Independence Payments for one of the children. They have capital/savings of £15,900. Their total weekly income is £614.47. The weekly Council Tax charge is £34.55. They currently receive Council Tax Support of £29.29 leaving them with £5.26 per week to pay. The proposed change would mean they no longer get any Council Tax Support and have to pay the full charge. Example 2: Mr and Mrs L have two children aged 1 and 15. Mr L works and the family also receive Child Benefit and Child Tax Credit. Their total weekly income is £253.62 a week. They also have savings of £10,486. The weekly Council Tax charge is £25.98 a week and they currently receive £22.02 a week Council Tax Support. This leaves them with £3.96 to pay. The proposed change would mean they no longer qualify and have to pay the full charge. In respect of this statement do you:


Proposal B - Introduce a self-employed minimum income Current scheme: Actual income from self-employment is used in the calculation of Council Tax Support Proposed change: We would use a minimum income for the self-employed. This would be in line with the UK Minimum Wage/new national Living Wage for 35 hours a week. From October 2015 the Minimum Wage will be £6.70 an hour. The rate for 18 to 20 year olds will be £5.30 an hour. The new national Living Wage will be £7.20 from April 2016. This minimum income would not be applied during the first year of self-employment. If a self-employed person has restrictions on the number of hours they can work we will work out the minimum income proportionately. Example 1: Mr and Mrs D have five children, aged 14, 13, 11, 9, & 7. Mr D is self- employed with a declared income of £17.06 a week and receives Working Tax Credit. Mrs D receives Child Tax Credit, Child Benefit, Carers Allowance and Disability Living Allowance (DLA) for 2 of the children. Their total weekly income is £888.83. Their weekly Council Tax charge is £23.94 and they currently receive £20.29 a week in Council Tax Support, leaving them £3.65 to pay. Applying the minimum income would mean we use £234.50 a week instead of the declared £17.06 a week for Mr D's self-employment. Mr and Mrs D would no longer be entitled to any help so would have to pay all of the £23.94 weekly Council Tax, an increase of £20.29 a week. Example 2: Miss B lives alone, is self-employed with a declared income of £68.30 a week and receives Working Tax Credit of £52.55 giving a total income of £120.85 a week. The weekly Council Tax charge is £16.35 after a 25% single person discount has been given. She currently also receives £9.23 in Council Tax Support leaving her with £7.12 per week to pay. Applying the minimum income would mean we use £234.50 a week instead of the declared £68.30 a week for Miss B's self-employment. Miss B would still receive the 25% single person discount but would no longer be entitled to Council Tax Support. She would have to pay £16.35 a week Council Tax, an increase of £9.23 a week. 
Proposal C - Introduce a Council Tax Band cap. Around 95% of working age Council Tax Support recipients live in properties in Council Tax band A, B or C. This proposal limits the amount of help people who live in a higher value property can get. Current scheme: The annual charge (less any discounts) for the Council Tax Band of the property the applicant lives in is used to calculate Council Tax Support entitlement. Proposed new scheme: Limit the charge used to calculate Council Tax Support entitlement to the Band C charge for the parish the applicant lives in. Example: Mrs B lives alone in a property which is in Council Tax Band E. The weekly charge for this property is £33.82. Mrs B currently receives a single person discount of £8.45 and her Council Tax Support of £9.95 leaving her with £15.42 per week to pay. The weekly charge for a Band C property in this parish is £24.60. Using this charge Mrs B's Council Tax Support is £4.13, which is a decrease of £5.82 a week meaning Mrs B has to pay an extra £5.82 more Council Tax per week. In respect of this statement do you:


Proposal D - Increase the Income taper for those not working while keeping the current lower income taper for those in work. Current Scheme: For every £1 of weekly income above the basic needs allowance we reduce Council Tax Support by 20 pence a week. This is the same for those who work and those who do not. Proposed new scheme: For those who do not work we will reduce Council Tax Support by 65 pence for every £1 of weekly income above their basic needs allowance. Those who are working will not be affected by this change. Example 1: Mr G works and earns £100 a week. His basic need allowance is £90 a difference of £10 a week. We would reduce his Council Tax Support by £2 a week (this is 20% of £10). Example 2: Mr K does not work and has the same weekly income of £100. His basic need allowance is £90 a difference of £10 a week. We would reduce his Council Tax Support by £6.50 a week (this is 65% of £10). In respect of this statement do you:


Are you liable to pay Council Tax?
