3. Notes from Joint Area North Annual Town & Parish Council Workshop

South Somerset District Council and Somerset County Council Joint Area North Annual Town & Parish Council Workshop

Thursday, 26th March 2009 at the Village Hall, Long Sutton.

(6.30 p.m. - 9.00 p.m.)

Networking Session

All representatives of the Town and Parish Councils participated in discussions with the Councillors, officers and service representatives present.

Introduction & Welcome

The Chairman welcomed everyone to the Workshop, stating that there was a good representation of Parishes present and their attendance was greatly appreciated. He introduced the officers and County and District Councillors present and the new Parish Representative on the Joint Area North Committee.

Philip Horsington – Parish Representative on SSDC/SCC Joint Area North Committee

Philip advised the audience that his role on the new Joint Area Committee was to put forward the parish perspective with regard to both planning and grant applications brought to the Committee. He noted that although he had no voting rights, he could put forward the principle of a Parish Council perspective, whilst not over-riding or substituting any Parish Council wishing to speak on a particular item.

Sergeant Alan Bell – Avon and Somerset Police

Sergeant Bell advised that the police had recently rearranged their areas to mirror the South Somerset area boundaries and so he was now the Sergeant for Area North. He noted that although the police may not have been good at communicating with the public and Parish Councils in the past, he now hoped to change this. He now expected his PCSO's and Beat Managers to contact each Town and Parish Clerk and advise them of the monthly crime figures within their area and they will offer to attend any Town or Parish Council meeting to speak to Councillors on crime issues. He stated he was the point of contact for any issues on Area North.

Peter Keenlyside – Volunteer Co-ordinator for Rights of Way (SSDC)

Peter Keenlyside spoke of the two schemes currently running to encourage local participation in footpath maintenance and improvement. These being the Parish Paths Stewardship Scheme and the Parish Paths Liaison Officer scheme. He said that volunteer input was very valuable as it helped towards delivering the service more efficiently, taught the volunteers new skills and encouraged active and social participation. He said problems on footpaths could be reported to either SSDC or SCC and they would be passed down to the appropriate officer.

Charlotte Jones – Head of Area Development (North) (SSDC)

Charlotte Jones outlined the area priorities identified by Town and Parish Councils at the last Annual Meeting and the schemes which had been supported by enhanced funding during 2008/09. She noted that over £67,000 of grants had been awarded to various schemes and projects within Area North during the past year, examples of which were the Somerton and Langport Links Transport Service (£4,000), South Petherton Bridge Club (£150) and the Fivehead Multi-Use Games Area (£12,500). She noted that £15,000 had recently been allocated for permanent rights of way improvements and Parishes would be contacted shortly regarding this. Funding had also been allocated to progress local affordable housing schemes within Area North. She advised that further funding would be available during 2009/10 and she advised those present to contact their Ward Councillor or the Community Development Officer (Les Collett) for further information.

Questions from the Audience

Rights of Way (questions answered by Peter Keenlyside)

- Q: Rights of Way there is a level of confusion between what SSDC do and what SCC do. Will there be a single point of contact in the future as it is confusing for Town and Parish Councils.
- A: It is hoped that the Parish Paths Stewardship Scheme and the Parish Paths Liaison Officer scheme will be merged later in the year which should help. Enquiries or complaints are generally reported to SSDC and are passed to George Montague, the Countryside Ranger or myself (Peter Keenlyside) to resolve. Some enquiries are received by SCC and these are filtered through to us. SCC encourage all fault reporting via their website or telephone in order to ensure accurate recording.
- Q: Bristol gates installed on a footpath have been locked by the farmer has this happened elsewhere and how was it resolved?
- A: Yes, this has happened elsewhere and was resolved by Rights of Way officers talking to landowners. Landowners are advised not to lock Bristol gates at the time of installation.

Police Issues (questions answered by Sergeant Alan Bell)

- Q: It appears that police officers can only work nights and PCSO's during the day. Is this a problem as most crime happens at night?
- A: PCSO's can only work up to 11.00p.m. I want them to become to the old village 'bobby' but they can only work between the hours of 8.00am to 11.00pm
- Q: Is it possible to use PCSO's on traffic management?
- A: Each police force sets out the powers within which their PCSO's operate. We are currently training and encouraging PCSO's to take on a wider role.
- Q: A French Market set up from 6.00am in our town but we can only get help with traffic management from 8.00am from PCSO's. Can you help any earlier?

A: I take your point but I cannot guarantee someone from 6.00am. Speak to me after the meeting.

Somerset County Highways (questions answered by Patrick Flaherty of Somerset County Highways)

- Q: Our road surfaces do not appear to be able to cope with the recent bad weather (flooding and freezing temperatures)
- A: Unfortunately, pot-holes are caused by water getting into cracks in the surface of the tarmac, freezing, and then lifting the tarmac. Surface dressing work is carried out during the summer months where roads are starting to crack but we tend to cover one area at a time. Roads on the levels have been particularly affected by the weather this year and although our performance is among the best in the country, the roads are still not perfect. Please phone our Area Highway office and report any pot-holes on 0845 345 9155.
- Q: How can local communities influence your service? We understand you have a lack of resources but sometimes the repair work carried out on pot-holes is substandard.
- A: I will report your comments on the quality of work. 95% of pot-holes reported to us are in need of immediate attention and are dealt with within 24 hours
- Q: What is the time period between marking a pot-hole for repair and actually doing the work?
- A: The severity of a pot-hole is assessed by a Highway Superintendent. All pot-holes present some risk and the officer takes into account size, location, depth, speed and volume of traffic, road alignment and visibility. It can be assessed as 24 hours, 7 days, 30 days or 3 months depending upon the above.
- Q: Do you also cover the M5? Their road surfacing work is accomplished quickly.
- A: No, this is maintained by the Highways Agency. They have more money to maintain a motorway surface to a higher standard because of the speed and volume of traffic using them.
- Q: Do you have an A,B,C classification of road priorities particularly relating to drain maintenance?
- A: There is a clearing and inspection regime of drainage at the side of roads but CCTV cameras are not routinely used to check the drains in between gullies. Large culverts and known problem areas are checked regularly.
- Q: What new roads have you recently built?
- A: There is 1 new road in Bridgwater, 2 in Taunton, various new estate roads and the park and ride scheme currently under construction in Taunton.

Streetscene Service (questions answered by Chris Cooper, Head of Streetscene)

- Q: I have been waiting for a green waste bin for some time and have been told that I am on a waiting list and the service is under review. What is happening?
- A: The green waste collection service is managed by the Somerset Waste Partnership and we will have to ask their officers to answer this question.
- Q: When fly tipping on the levels occurs the Streetscene service are very good at clearing, but, do you have any ideas on prevention?
- A: We do have covert surveillance on regular sites but a rural area like the levels is very difficult to cover. Possibly local vigilance may be the only answer. We cannot use Fixed Penalty Notices in these instances but must go to Court with solid evidence and proof and a Judge then decides the penalty.

HIGHWAY SERVICE BUDGETS FOR 2009/10

At the first meeting of the Somerset County Council and South Somerset District Council Joint Area North Committee on 28th January 2009, a report was presented on Water Management and reducing Flood Risk within Area North of South Somerset District Council.

During open debate of the report, the heavy rainfall of 29th May and 12th and 13th December 2008 and the resulting flooding of many properties across South Somerset was discussed and Members sought re-assurance that SCC and SSDC would continue to maintain the high level of service to the public in the event of another occurrence, particularly in relation to the clearing of gullies and jetting of drains.

As Somerset County Council Portfolio Holder for Highway Services, Councillors asked that I write to seek your assurance that there are no planned reductions to County Council budgets, during a difficult financial climate, with subsequent reduction in service in this vital emergency area.

I would be pleased if you would confirm current and planned service levels for 2009/10, and any other information that you feel would be of interest to the Joint Area Committee, and the communities it serves.

HIGHWAY SERVICE BUDGETS FOR 2009/10

Thank you for your letter of 6 February 2009, addressed to Councillor Tony Shire, regarding the flooding events in May and December 2008. Councillor Shire has asked me to reply to you direct.

First may I apologise for the delay that has occurred in writing to you. This has been due to an oversight on my part and I am disappointed I have not met the response time I would expect of myself or my staff.

I am pleased that the Joint Area North Committee at its meeting on 28 January recognised the high level of service provided by both the county and district councils during those difficult times in May and December. Staff and operatives from both authorities worked long hours in difficult conditions to alleviate the problems faced by many, often without recognition.

As we recently discussed and as indicated in my letter to the Somerset Water Management Partnership on 19 February 2009 there is a role for many agencies, including our authorities, to play in reducing the likelihood of flooding and I am grateful for your support in promoting this integrated approach. I am very much aware of the close working relationship that already exists between the County's Area Office staff and the land drainage officer for South Somerset District Council and clearly we need to engage, more closely, with other bodies such as the Environment Agency, the National Farmers Union and Water Boards.

As you are aware the Pitt Review has made a large number of recommendations in response to the major flooding that occurred in several parts of the country during 2007 and there will be a need for all agencies, which have an involvement, to show commitment in meeting the recommendations. I am pleased to say that the County Council has started to examine its role in this but unfortunately it appears that some district councils may be reducing their capacity to deal with land drainage issues, which together with river overflows are the main contributory factors to the flooding of property

and roads. It would therefore be re-assuring to know that South Somerset District Council will maintain or increase its resources in this area.

With regard to the planned service levels for 2009/10 the County Council has a difficult task balancing the demands and needs of all the services provided against limited budget availability. This is compounded by the difficult financial climate that now exists. However I am pleased to say that the routine maintenance drainage budget for South Somerset which includes gully cleansing, drain jetting and minor drainage works has been increased from £630,700 to £705,900. This represents a 12% increase on the 2008/09 base line budget.

I hope the above is helpful and again apologies for the delay in providing this information.
