10. Capital Programme 2010/11 to 2014/15

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Purpose of the Report

1. To outline the resources available for new schemes and to agree the new schemes to be included in revised Capital Programme from 2010/11.

Please refer to the District Executive agenda for the appendices to this report.

Action Required

- 2. That the Scrutiny Committee: -
 - (a) Consider and comment to the District Executive on the proposed recommendations for approval on pages 19 and 20 of the agenda for inclusion in the revised capital programme, as shown in Appendix E.
 - (b) Consider and comment to the District Executive on the proposals to delay and review the set up of a reserve for the Sports Zone on page 20 of the agenda.
 - (c) Note that there is no change in the available funding from the ICT reserve as outlined on page 20 of the agenda.

Background

3. In accordance with the Capital Strategy, capital bids for 2010/11 have been reviewed by the Project Resources Group and subjected to the scoring analysis; a review of available resources has also been undertaken. This report recommends which projects should be included in the Capital Programme which will be formally approved by Full Council in February.

Capital Strategy

4. The Capital Strategy has been revised and agreed by District Executive and Council in December 2009. The strategy outlines the release of set aside resources over the life of the Corporate Plan and allows for the revenue consequences of this.

Current Capital Programme

5. The Capital Programme currently approved for 2010/11 to 2014/15 is attached at Appendix A (this has taken into account slippage as at quarter 2). The total

- programme currently stands at £13.7 million and includes the schemes that have been already agreed in previous years.
- 6. The following projects have slippage in expenditure during 2009/10 that is now included within the 2010/11 figures:

Capital Resources

- 10. The new capital strategy introduces a revised methodology for the allocation of capital resources.
- 11. The previous capital strategy outlined the release of £18 million of resources (plus any additional receipts received) to finance capital expenditure to 2012/13. Currently £4.58 million of that sum remains unallocated and will be returned to capital resources.

- 12. The revised methodology is based on any surpluses from the previous year in interest earned, new capital receipts, and affordability.
- 13. Funds totalling £435,000 can be released for new starts in 2010/11 as follows:

New Capital Bids 2010/11

14. The capital bids for new schemes starting in 2010/11 and for future bids are shown at Appendix B. The scoring analysis is attached at Appendix C. If all bids were to be approved the effect on capital resources for future years would be as follows:

- 15. Appendix B divides the schemes between essential, prioritised schemes, and other schemes that cannot yet be scored. Essential schemes include those schemes that that are for refurbishment of the Council's own assets, providing that the need for refurbishment has been assessed and justified. Essential will also include schemes that the Council is obliged in order to comply with legal or health and safety requirements.
- 16. The detailed Capital Investment Appraisal pro-formas for each new scheme are attached at Appendix D. These provide full details of the outcomes, partner funding and the monitoring/evaluation arrangements.

Recommendations for Approval

17. The following recommendations are based on the scoring methodology and schemes scoring 550 points and above. The current recommendations for inclusion within the 2010/11 capital programme are attached at Appendix E. The effect of this on future resources is outlined below:

Sports Zone

19. The Sports Zone report was outlined to Full Council on the 11th December 2008. It outlined that funds of a maximum of £6 million will need to be set to one side through a reserve should SSDC progress the project. It is prudent that this funding is set to one side in advance. However delays in the scheme mean that there is no requirement to make a contribution in 2010/11 and this can be reviewed again for the 2011/12 budget.

ICT Reserve

20. The ICT Reserve has been put in place to replace hardware and systems as the need arises. There are no bids for funding for 2010/11 so available resources are unchanged from last year:

Revenue Implications

21. The revenue costs of releasing the funds outlined above will be £19,450, of which £17,150 relates to interest, as indicated on Appendix E. However as the majority of the resources have been found from additional interest earned and new capital receipts the impact of interest on the Medium Term Financial Plan is only £200. However, had these sums been set aside to earn interest then £16,960 could have been added as a saving to the MTFP. The overall revenue impact on the MTFP is £2,500 (£200 relating to interest and £2,300 direct net revenue expenditure).

Next Steps

- 22. Schemes will be considered by the Scrutiny Committee on the 5th January 2010 draft notes of that meeting will be reported verbally with the minutes available to District Executive for final consideration in February 2010.
- 23. New schemes to start in 2010/11 will then receive final approval at District Executive in February as part of the overall MTFP report. The final recommendations of the District Executive will then be submitted to full Council for formal approval on 25 February 2010.
